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

The day was spent meeting and greeting people and generally having a bit of fun. Casting demonstrations helped get people interested as they saw how easy it is to cast a line.


We have already been invited down for next year for those who may want to consider coming down and having some fun. The event acted as a fundraiser was very successful.

My Island Dream

I am sure that at some time we have thought how good it would be to travel to an island where we could fly fish to our hearts content, where the fish have rarely seen a fly and you have magical beaches and a river from the sea all to yourself. Where the weather is kind at a constant 25 to 30 degrees daily whilst at home temperatures were reaching the high 40's. where the wind is indeed my friend and for all bar two days was a light breeze. Nevertheless the two windy days were unfishable so 4 out of 6 wasn't bad

Well such a place I recently visited much to Lorraine and my delight and we will return for longer visits where possible. No I am not telling you where it is suffice to say that it was one of approximately fifty islands in its proximity.

My host Shayne, a keen fly fisherman, wanted to show me a spot where he had caught salmon, albeit on lures, and the plan was to fish a river in the north east of the island on an incoming tide. He stated the tide became quite strong as it flowed in and we would only have a limited window being the last of the run out and perhaps twenty minutes of the run in. It was necessary for us to walk onto drained flats that would fill with the incoming tide and if we left our departure too long we would be wading out through some strong and deepish water.

Having got an estimate of the turn of the tide and allowing for our trip time of approximately one hour (fair sized island eh!) we set off. Arriving at the mouth we could see that the tide was still on the out. We discussed several locations and both agreed that the go was where we were advised 2 posts were sticking out of the water about 100 metres apart on the river bed at low tide was the go.

cast had me snagged on some rocks which I had in fact thought was weed. Glancing along the bank I was aware of a steep drop off and the rocks ran all the way back to Shayne and beyond.

As I walked past Shane I said it was too rocky and I would try further down towards the other post. He said that he had had a small whiting follow. Walking along looking at the water I saw a large sandy area between the rocks. I fired out a cast a reasonable distance and back upstream and allowed the fly to run with the current. The 300 gram intermediate sink shooting head did its job and got it down. Reaching IRS downward swing I gave a tentative strip and immediately felt the full weight of something that was certainly not a small whiting.

Shayne had seen the strike and yelled out could he help in some way. I replied *Yeah, come down and take a photo for me* and then realised how stupid that was as the hard work in landing the fish had only just began. Fortunately I was using my Sage XI3 and not say a Thomas & Thomas and so pressure was applied straight away with me moving the rod to counteract the fish's movement. It took some line but the whole fight was hand lining it in. It travelled sideways back and forth and on reaching the drop off I could tell it was not a happy chappie. This was the first time we saw colour and Shayne correctly called salmon and a good one. The water was only ankle deep after the drop off so one one of its sideways rushes I made the decision that now was the time and lifted the rod high and walked backwards with full pressure on the fish. Nope didn't work until the next time when I managed to drag it from its comfort zone into mine.

Shane quickly tailed it and it was brought clear of the water. It was a nice fish at 4 to 5 pounds and had given me a good idea of the fighting ability of a salmon on fly.

Having taken the obligatorv photos it was time to high tail it out. We kept the salmon as Shavne wanted to smoke it saying they were a delight to eat that way. The unfortunate thing was that we only had a window to fish of approximately

30 minutes on this occasion and if we had done our sums right it could have been a lot longer. We fished a couple of other locations on the way back but to be quite honest the Canon DSLR I was carrying seemed to take precedence over the fly.


We further fly fished another couple of days off a pier and managed a number of Silver Trevalley which on a 5 wt put up a good fight. The pier accounted for a number being lost.


