Bucket List Bonefish



'Big GT- Cast 30 foot, two o'clock''. My heart rate was already up a little but this GT was about the size of a coffee table and the water was only knee high.

The cast was pretty fair and the GT came after the fly. Strip faster was the call. When the fish was only a rod length or so way it hit my little size 6 Crazy Charlie. The rod loaded for but a second and the fish was gone. As it turned it was like someone had thrown a bucket of water at us and the big GT vanished. Such is fishing on Kiribati and we were

not even after GT's.

Ever since seeing the bonefish episode on "A River Somewhere" all those years ago I have wanted to tangle with one. Watching Gavin Hurley's trips only made me keener to add bonefish to my list of fish caught on fly.

Fast forward to July 2014 and Rod Esdaile and I are on Kiribati, casting to and catching these amazing fish.

The following story will describe our trip, Kiribati and the fantastic bonefish that live there and a few thought on how to catch them. I'm already booked in to return in 2015, that's how good it was.

Kiribati is often called Christmas Island but this often leads to confusion with the other Christmas Island so often in the news so for the purpose of this story Kiribati it is.

Kiribati was first in the news in the late 50's and early 60's when the United Kingdom and the



USA used the area to conduct nuclear tests without evacuating the residents. Many were hurt by the tests.

Kirabati is about 230k north of the equator. If you travel at 45 degrees from Fiji you will be close. The next island heading north is Hawaii.

Although beautiful it is a true third world country. Even if you think you have seen people doing it hard before your eyes will be opened. It is a long day getting there. Leave Sydney around lunchtime and fly to Nandi Fiji.

There is then a six hour layover before you reboard and fly out at midnight arriving at Kiribati at 6.30am. Allowing for 4 hours time difference you have been up for a bit longer than 24 hours at this time.

If you are desperate you can start fishing straight away or have a nana nap for a few hours.



Based on our experience a quick nap is wise.

We stayed at Ikari House which is probably the best accommodation on the island. It is probably 3 star at best (maybe 2) but is clean, has good beds, shower flushing toilet and air conditioning. Meals are eating out front and as the picture shows it's not a bad view.

Now speaking of food !

Breakfast is usually a mix of bacon, eggs, sausages and cereal.

You are away fishing during the day so lunch is simple. Cold meat and salad sandwiches.

Dinner is where Ikari House shines. Tradition is to have a cold beer and also shout the guides one or a soft drink if that is your choice. \$3.50 a can is reasonable.

Entrée nearly always includes sashimi (I love sashimi) and this is as good as it gets. Add to this prawns, fish cocktails, chicken or breadfruit and you should be happy.

Mains usually include fish steaks, meat or slightly Indian styled food (but not hot) with salads. We had lobster 3 nights and the last night a full roast pig.







Now let's go fishing.



Wake up time is usually around 6.00am and after breakfast you are in the boat shortly after 7.00am. The boats are moored only a few hundred meters from Ikari House and travel is by mini bus.

Usually it is two fishermen to a guide but on a day or two you may get a guide to yourself.

The guides are good and their ability to see fish is unbelievable. Expect to move around a bit as they know the tides and how bonefish move with them.

I was concerned about my capacity to wade the flats but found only a few areas where I had trouble. When I got a bit tired I had a nap on the boat for an hour or so. Best sleep I've had in a long time.

Sight fishing on shallow flats is what brings us to Kiribati and it is everything I expected and more. It helps if you can cast accurately but Rod and I managed just fine even though on two days the wind exceeded 70kph.

When the wind is up, the water is milky or the tide is wrong you may have to blind fish a bit but the surprise when an unseen fish hits is guaranteed to shock the living daylights out of you.

There are two key things to remember when fighting a bonefish.

Firstly you MUST strip strike. It's easy but I lost some fish by forgetting this and striking like I do for trout or bass.

Secondly is something I still don't really know how to overcome. The first run of a bonefish is something that no amount of watching DVDs or reading books will prepare you for. They are fast, often hitting 70kph where a trout can't hit 15kph. Not all will take you into the backing but many will.



I estimate my best fish took me 180 meters into the backing against a seriously locked drag but this is not the problem.

After this run they usually swim straight back at you and there is no way you can strip in or wind fast enough to keep the line tight. I usually flatten the barbs on my flies but for bonefish I don't think this is wise. As soon as the pressure is off on a barbless hook so was my fish. Just my theory. The fun part is that after this the next run is as fast and long as the first.



Bonefish are clean fighters but there are bits of coral around and if your line rubs against these it's all over.

In addition to bonefish we caught Gts, blue trevally, yellow snapper, groper, puffer fish, sand mullet, long tom and queen fish.

I never caught a queenfish and the guides never called one for me. When asked they said Kiribati is crawling with queenies but why would you bother. Rod got one

So what gear is needed to catch a bonefish?

If restricted to only one choice an 8 weight would be my selection. You don't need a million dollar rod. My Stalker Aire and Rod's Teeny TFO were well up to the task.

What you do need is a reel with a bullet proof drag as these things will destroy anything less. I used my 5-6 weight Cheeky and even though this was smaller than theoretically necessary it did a great job. The drag was brilliant and as good on the last day as the first. It held about 250 meters of backing which was sufficient.

In regard to lines there are a number of specialist bonefish lines around and it is worth getting one. I used nothing bar a floating line.

Specialist bonefish leaders are also available and 15 pound is close to an all round leader.

I took over a hundred flies and only used about twenty. Overkill indeed but if you run out you are in trouble.

Think crazy charlies and clousers. Charlies in size 4-8 and clousers between 2 and 2/0. My



best bonefish took a white and orange 2/0 bucktail and raccoon clouser.


Do not use cheap hooks. Lynne bought me a box of EBay bonefish flies from a well known seller. Two bonefish=2 crushed hooks. Sparse is the name of the game.

Finally take very bit of sun protection you have. Sun screen, lip balm and a buff.

Don't wear shorts. One of our group did for one day and he suffered for the week !

It costs money (just over \$4,000) for 9 days away but this is somewhere you must visit at least once. \$1,600 of this amount is air fare so considering meals, accommodation and guided fishing are all included it's not bad at all.

You only live once so this is a must do for any fly fisherman.
