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

The Queensland cyclone season played havoc with the fishing, but trips away with the club is not so much about quantity, but about bonding and enjoying each others company, and maybe learning a few new tricks on the way. The new club trailer was used for the first time and was a real hit. Hats/sombereros off to the Sydney connection for your hard work in pulling it together.

Foxy has a weekend planned for Lake Lyle this weekend. My fond memories of this freshwater system stemmed from fishing the Cox's River as a young bloke, learning how to cast a fly and catch trout with my fly fishing dad, then wandering the surrounding hills rabbiting, as most lads of my era did. The river was then dammed to form the cooling water top up pondage for Mt Piper and Wallerawang power stations. Things changed, but we can adapt. I started to catch larger fish, and more of them.

Throw Another Shrimp on the Vice

On Saturday second of February, by 8.30am members were starting to dribble in, set up and start the usual club outing preamble of catching up and swapping stories. Brett and Cherie brought along materials suitable for tying the day's flies to purchase on the day if members required.



As always, Brett gave a good explanation of the materials he uses to tie his shrimp patterns and the importance of each material used in each fly. As an added bonus both Brett and Cherie describe how they fish with these flies including: rod/reel size; line and leader set-up.

Brett went through his tried and true techniques and methods for tying these effective shrimp patterns. From spacing, positioning and securing the material and positioning the eyes to utilising the uv resin to

hold the materials in place. Brett explained each step carefully and thoroughly. Nothing was left out and with each question put forward, Brett took the time to answer explicitly with nothing left out.

Cherie, also an accomplished tier, was ever present answering questions about tactics and equipment walking around the room helping out where she could, also sharing knowledge on the various materials used in tying the flies.

The first fly tied was Shannon's Whiting Fly (a variation on the Crazy Charlie). Designed by Shannon Kitchener and designed for targeting the whiting on the flats at Forster/Tuncurry, this is one effective fly and tied with only a couple of materials makes for an easy tie.



The first shrimp on the vice was the Disco Shrimp. This is one of Drew Chicone's creations tied with Brett's modification of how the sequins are tied in. This fly is very effective as a surface fly for bream and estuary perch alike, even whiting. The Disco Shrimp can be tied with a stinger hook at the front of

the fly to help turn those short takes in to solid hook-ups.

Second fly to hit the vice was the Raw Prawn which is one of Brett's own designs. The Raw Prawn has evolved over the years since it's first original tie. Brett wanted something in light color to target the flathead around the weed edges in the clear waters of Forster/Tuncurry. The popularity/evolution of the Raw Prawn has seen it transform from catching the humble flattie to being a gun bream fly catching old *blue lips* from the mid north coast of NSW down along the coast to Victoria and even crossing the Bass Strait to Tasmania. Also, catching school jew in Victoria as well.



Next shrimp on the vice was another of Brett's own designs: The Versatile Shrimp: designed to catch bream in two and a half metres of water with a weedy bottom; not too heavy to bounce along just above or on the bottom. Living up to its name, the Versatile Shrimp, has proven very popular with the EP fraternity and even the dam bass find the Versatile Shrimp irresistible.



Once Brett had demonstrated a fly, it was back to everyone's own vice to have a go at tying their own unique version of the fly Brett had just tied.

Lunch was a simple affair (can't eat for too long, there's more flies to tie) with Patrick and Tallis manning the barb-b-que cooking up sausages, chicken kebabs and fried onion for everyone to make sandwiches with. This was also a Bunnings free site with patrons capable of deciding for their selves on just how and where their fried onion was positioned on their sandwiches.

After the BBQ lunch had been decimated to a few mere scraps, we were back at the main vice ready for Brett's next tie.



Not quite a shrimp but still a crustacean, Brett demonstrated how to tie a Turneffe Crab. The Turneffe Crab was originally designed by Craig Mathews for the permit and bonefish of Turneffe Flats of Turneffe Atoll, Belize. The Turneffe Crab is now renowned as a good all-round saltwater pattern for a variety of saltwater species.



Last but not least and never one to be left out (bloody bass always trying to steal the limelight), the Simple Bass Popper utilising the double barrel popper heads. Brett and Cherie have been having good success on this little winner.

With several members looking at a lengthy drive home and with six fly patterns tied for the day, it was time to call it quits by 2.00pm. A huge thanks to Brett and Cherie for travelling up to participate on our fly-tying day and to demonstrate tying several flies, also bringing along some materials to purchase. Thanks to Cherie for the choicy biscuits too, they went down a treat with a cuppa. Thanks to the members that turned up for the day especially the Sydney guys (always good to catch up with the club's southern chapter) and thanks to Patrick and Tallis for helping out on the BBQ too.



HVFFC CLUB TRAILER

Our anniversary present to ourselves is a shiny new catering trailer. After years of toing and froing about the current one, Foxy and I were authorised to start from scratch. Actually our original plan was to replace the canopy on the current one, but factoring in its sale, it was only a few hundred more to begin again and have everything the way we wanted it.

And here it is...



I am sure you would expect a product from the Fox Network to be engineered to 100% and then some, and to be honest I occasionally had to remind him that "it's only a fishing club trailer" (otherwise you'd have something from the Batcave), but make no mistake, between two OTT engineers, sage and timely advice from Peter Sewell, Mik Ewen and Cherie and Lawrence Blackburn, the contribution of time by Tony Ward and hard yakka by Brian Willett, signage by Mick Grigor and materials by Foxy himself, Darren Foster, Alex Hartsuyker, Brian and myself, we really do have a useful addition to our club. Thank you everyone.

So here's how it works...



There is a spirit level on the drawbar. The BBQ drain hole is in the middle of the plate so we need the trailer as flat as possible. A wooden wedge is stored under the deck for levelling.



The BBQ is now permanently fixed to the trailer and slides out on drawers on the left hand side. Please lower the two stabilisers first as they act as brakes as well as counterbalancing the BBQ, remove the locking pin located close to the gas inlet, pull out the BBQ all the way and replace the locking pin, install the fat collection jar and then connect up a gas bottle. The gas bottles are fixed too. The BBQ has a single support leg which is stored under the deck. Preferably use the left hand burners, so we keep the spatter out of

the trailer. On the trailer's right hand side is the icebox which can be removed if you wish, and on the left hand side is a wooden camp box donated by Brian Willett which contains cooking implements and a separate Primus stove and bottle for when we just need a cuppa. This box is also removable. Gazebos, tables, the stabiliser winder plus a few spare chairs are under the deck.

Everything was intended to prevent bad backs from awkward lifting of heavy items.

The light switch panel is accessible from both the back and the left side. There are separate switches for the BBQ and the serving area. The third switch activates the voltmeter and USB charger (yes, you can charge your phone but only if we're connected to 240V, because phone chargers draw substantial power and we don't have a big battery). The last two switches are currently unused.

The trailer now has a permanent battery charger in place. I have done this because the unfortunate soul who gets to store the thing (namely Tom Jones) has to regularly refresh the battery and now he just has to flick a switch. Also, when we do have 240V, it can feed the battery, run all the lights, the daisy chain of LEDs and charge two or even three phones. There's a powerboard on board too. It's our intention to install a solar panel if one falls off the back of a truck, or to use members' portable solar panels as needed. With regard to the daisy chain of LEDs, the club has quite a collection of 12 volt light bars which connect together. They can be run from the cigarette/Merrit plug on the switch panel. They are stored in a PVC tube in the base of the trailer. The battery box is removable if you want to use the LED bars further away.

The battery is in good nick, but we can't allow it to drain too far, so if you're running lots of lights, can I please ask you to watch the voltmeter (third switch). If it reads close to 10.8V under load (i.e. when the lights are on) it's time to shut down. The battery can't stand a heavy discharge.

There has been many weeks of design and construction work on this project, but nothing is really ever finished. And so I ask all of you, if you can see something which could work better or you think of something which would make a good addition to the trailer, please talk to Foxy as a first choice and me as second, and we will attempt to bring it to fruition with the aid of Darren and everyone else. Who knows, we might get the Batmobile after all.

Again I want to thank all those who contributed. Nearly a quarter of the club have had input into the process, in some form or another. If we'd paid for all this we'd be well past \$5000 in materials alone, but due to the generosity of the members, the diligence of finding the cheapest way, the Ebay way, the Bunnings way, the negotiated way, we've kept costs to a minimum, and the final bill, after the sale of the old trailer will be about \$3500. An appropriate and long lasting anniversary present to ourselves.
