

*Windermere 14th – 16th October*Trip Master Mik

Cudgegong Waters is the camping grounds on Lake Windermere, approximately 3.5 hour drive from Newcastle, via Bylong, and around 20 minutes the other side of Rylstone. This is the sole public boat launching area on the lake. Expect to catch some of the biggest Yellas in Australia, maybe a Cod or even Silvers if you want to target them. But why be limited just to Windermere, slip into Rylstone to Shop 41 for a coffee and feed, or do some kayaking and sight-seeing on the beautiful Dunns Swamp, see the picture below.



Cudgegong Waters offer a variety of accommodation to suit preferences and budget. There are powered or unpowered sites, standard self-contained cabins with or without ensuites. To book your accommodation do online at https://cudgegongwaterspark.com.au, or phone 0263588462 from 8am – 6pm.

I am planning a stew for the Saturday night meal. Sarah lee slab cake (chocolate or banana), cream and tin peaches. Self-catering for all your other meals, including water and refreshments.

Mudgee is a 45minute drive if you fancy wine tasting or a spot of shopping.

Firewood and preferred Sherb%t "truth serum" for tales of the day.



Fishing gear can be 8wt-9wt gear to handle Goldens/Cod/Silvers. Sinking, Intermediate and floating for evening poppers.





Yellow Spotters show the fish as Turquoise torpedoes. Good shoes, Snake Bandages and spare jocks as you are likely to encounter Tigers and Browns.

There is plenty of bank to access if you are up for a walk, but having a boat opens access to more fishing areas around the lake. Expect rocky ground, steep drop offs, weed beds and submerged structure.


The Turon below Sofala, or accessed via Turon Gates has trout early season, silvers, cod and carp if looking for more options to explore.

Peter cleaned up with Craigs Nighttimes on intermediate line last time, but black leach patterns work, along with large wooly buggers, bunny flies or whatever else you might want to throw at them. Start stocking up on flies.

The secret to find Gold is balmy weather.

2022 Swansea Salmon Classic Jeff Yates

Fishing:- A bit slow to start, with a couple of members commencing their weekend early with a Wed start, having travelled from Coffs. Numerous reports of fish in Salts Bay, but some difficulty getting them to take the fly. However, the old proverb, "good things come to those who wait", certainly rang true for many who turned up on the very successful weekend. By Saturday, the early morning fishing was superb, with massive schools in Salts Bay doing their tailing ritual as a prelude to spawning, only to be interrupted by monsters from the deep sending the school into a white frothy wave. The salmon still took flies while being marauded from below, but the outgoing tide soon pushed the school out through the heads. Though, the 31 boats in the bay certainly didn't help our cause. On our return to the boat ramp we came across a few of our members having a beach party in the Blacksmiths boat ramp bay.

My partner left Wagga Wagga when she was 18 and has since shown absolutely no desire to go back. Sure, she visits every few years to see her family but it's never been high on our list of family holiday destinations, and due to work I'd never accompanied her on one of these forays to the motherland. However, with covid restrictions lifted and a break in both our work schedules, we decided the time was ripe to visit Nonna and Grandpa in the land of many crows.

Based on Claire's girlhood recollections I was expecting a barren hellscape of dust and locusts, however the internet insisted that there was in fact water in Wagga, and what's more, it held cod! As such I started tying up 6/0 and 8/0 monstrosities of feather, fur and flash on the off chance we crossed a creek or river on our way down. This plan was somewhat curtailed by a plan to fly rather than drive, but this merely required a tweak of plans, and some smaller yellowbelly patterns were added to the box to fish Lake Albert in town.

Remembering to remove my rod from the car this time, we were greeted by grey skies and a frigid westerly when we touched down on the tarmac of Wagga's quaint airport. Not exactly ideal fishing conditions, but still better than the Mad Max scene I had been primed for. We loaded up the suspension-free Berlina and took the scenic route back to Nonna and Grandpa's house.

As we drove through town the Murrumbidgee revealed itself as swollen and turbid, a testament to the wet summer past. Once we got home and unpacked I wandered down to Lake Albert to practice casting and enjoy some solitude. No fish were forthcoming, but it was satisfying to put into practice some of the techniques for dealing with a headwind, learned at the club's casting clinic.

After making our way through Claire's café list and visiting the local tackle shop (you should been here a few weeks ago!), I managed an afternoon off to visit a tributary of the 'bidge. It too was running high, dirty and cold, but at least the steep banks cut most of the wind. Acquiescing to common sense

and the tackle shop proprietor's advice, I kept the 8wt stowed and opted to throw a big surface lure instead. It wasn't fly fishing, but it was fun getting reacquainted with the baitcaster.

With no signs of cod after a couple of hours walking and scrabbling along the bank, I allowed myself to become distracted by the carp mudding along the bank. They weren't big fish (most around the 40cm mark) but they were much, much less spooky than the river carp at home, most feeding happily as I stood next to them on the bank. In the interests of experiencing one fish during the trip, I assembled the fly rod and tied on a Sunbaker. It wasn't so much a cast as an ungainly flop as I tried to guess where the carp's head was positioned in the turbid water. Drawing the streamer past what I assumed was its nose, the tippet caught on some grass and lifted the fly out of the water. As such, all but the zonker tail of the fly was high and dry when a smaller fish sauntered over and plucked it off the blade of grass. The close quarters fight was over quickly (I'm not sure my fly line even touched the water, let's call it euro-carping) but at least I had the monkey off my back, and the terrestrial eat had been cool to watch.


Continuing up the river I threw the (expensive) surface monstrosity for a bit longer, before lodging it in a tree just out of reach. Balancing on a log, I could just about get to the lure, when the log shifted, pitching me headfirst into the cold, brown water with almost comical slowness. I'm not sure if I swam out or if the cold shock propelled me back up the bank, but I was wet through. In a soggy huff I broke the lure off and retrieved it with a stick (intelligent tool-use a little too late) and squelched back to the car, mentally preparing how I would explain that this wasn't even close to my worst day out.

Dried off and (eventually) warmed up, we headed home a couple of days later. The weather and fishing may not have been ideal, but Wagga Wagga had its charms, and I think we'll be back. Mind you, I wouldn't recommend swimming as a winter activity.



If you haven't got any or fished Bendbacks something to consider, you can fish these over and through ribbon weed and mangrove roots and hardly pick up any weed or get snagged, and with a slow sink hopefully they are in the zone long enough that a big Flatty won't be able to refuse.
