Busted Bolts

I've never been to Windamere before, but tales of sight-fishing big golden footballs captured my imagination, so I applied for spousal leave well in advance to ensure I could attend the November club outing to Big W. After hanging in the balance at the mercy of floods, the Windamere trip was confirmed and we headed West looking for gold.

After some back and forth regarding the best route to take I arrived at the park and set up camp near Mick and Paul, treating myself to the luxury of the family tent and two (two!) mattresses. By this point a cool breeze was making itself felt and a few beers at camp seemed a better option than launching the boat, so Mick and I made plans to hit the water first thing in the morning.

The morning dawned cool, crisp and still. I pushed the boat out while Mick parked the car, drifting out on the mirrored surface. After half a dozen pulls the outboard was refusing to show any signs of life. I picked up Mick and he had a go, still nothing. Ah well, probably flooded it. We set off under electric power, down a few layers of clothes for our exertions.

We cruised around nearby points and timber under electric power, casting at all the likely haunts. The water was coloured, but not filthy, and we consistently felt we were a chance of fish. With the dam so full we were spoiled for choice on structure and flooded vegetation, and it was hard to know where to focus on a dam and a species that was new to both of us on fly. Every now and then Mick would have a crack at the outboard (clearly he's more optimistic than me), but to no avail. After a few hours we cruised back to shore for lunch and a debrief.

Reports were that everyone was finding it tough, with only one fish landed for the group. There was also a sea of kayak anglers on the water as part of an outing, who were also struggling. Over the course of lunch I noticed a skid on my trailer needed adjusting. My mechanical skills are extremely limited, but this falls just within my wheelhouse, so I grabbed a shifter and loosened the bolt. In fact, I loosened the head right off the shaft. Accepting that I now had a non-functional outboard on an injured trailer, the only thing for it was to go bank bashing for the arvo.

Mick and I headed down to the bottom end of the dam in search of cleaner water. Luckily for us the high level meant it was only a short walk from the road. Things looked much better at this end of the dam, with clean water and loads of baitfish, but the yellas were still conspicuous in their absence. Chatting to a couple of kayak anglers running sounders, apparently there were plenty of fish around, but no one could get them to open their mouths. Eventually we called it quits and headed back to see how everyone else fared.

Reports were that the fishing had been tough for all, with no more fish landed, though a few members had spotted fish and had follows. A hearty stew courtesy of Mik helped ease both

fishing and non-fishing pains (I'll leave it to Mik or Graham to tell that story, but it makes a reluctant outboard and a sheared bolt sound like a walk in the park).

The next morning I visited the same bank as the previous afternoon for much the same result, but gosh watching the sunrise over a glassed out lake is lovely. Returning to the park I broke camp, added an extra strap to the trailer, and headed back home, this time with Pete Sewell along for the ride. Dodging potholes we made good time, and the trip felt faster with some company. Stopping off at the farm on the way Pete and I ran some diagnostics on the outboard and established it wasn't a fuel issue. Pete seemed to think the spark from the plugs might not be enough to ignite under compression, so at least I had a first port of call. We left the tinny to keep the club trailer company and headed back to Newy.

I dropped Pete off and returned home, tired from driving. My partner can't understand how I could drive an 8.5 hr round trip, have my boat not work, damage the trailer, not catch any fish, and still have a nice time, but I guess if you know you know. It's the vibe of the thing.





P.S. I'm happy to report that the outboard is now running like a charm (new spark plugs) and the trailer has been repaired (new bracket tube combined with some angle grinding and swearing), just in time for the November outing to Clarencetown.
