

Trout fishing in the high country

The trip was planned a few weeks back and it has been a busy time making cakes (thanks ladies) and cooking meals for the week away. Weather patterns have been studied and appropriate clothes packed. A number of emails and messages flowed between the three of us as we fine tuned the details. Trip master Peter had a 2000ltr tank to deliver to Jindabyne, so he was chuffed that both myself and Kevin could give him a hand with the transport and delivery.

We departed Kevin's place at 6am, hoping to get through the city with the trailer before the morning peak. On the way we stopped at Goulburn's Trappers Bakery. Its always good for a stop with a coffee and meat pie. We hit the tarmac again and were soon circumnavigating a very full Lake George. I wonder if anyone has fished this lake, and if so what would you catch? The margins look ideal for hunting carp if they are in there.

Cooma loomed up large and we had a compulsory stop at the Alpine Angler on the southern outskirts. Unfortunately, they don't seem to stock much, so we were able to save our pennies for a visit to our favourite tackle store, BWC at Tuggerah when we got home. Back on the road, we dropped off the tank, picked up an ATV and headed into camp. The cabin had been unoccupied for a month, so our dear little friends, the Antechinus (marsupial mice), decided to inhabit the space, but they are such dear little creatures, keeping down

the vermin that would otherwise move in during our absence, so we tolerated the pitter patter of their little feet on the ceiling all week, mostly in the wee hours of the morning!

Kev couldn't wait to explore the river, and soon inspected the close by waterholes. He was extremely excited about the platypus working the various large reed lined holes, but they are such shy creatures, that he only managed a few grainy videos, but the experience was immeasurable. He reported back that few trout could be seen rising, and the chill of the air would probably not help an evening rise.

The next day we made a concerted effort to score our first fish. Try as we may, wets and nymphs were refused, and the only rises were to a few midge swirling around in the shadows. Later on in the day the occasional Kosciuszko dun wriggled to the surface, thankful to be free of its shuck, and sailed off down the stream. Unfortunately, the message didn't reach the rest of the clan, so only a few small fish rose to the occasion.

Another new day was punctuated with some wood chopping and a trip up the river to do a little exploring to try and crack the trout code. We saw some lovely country but once again no rise or fish interest. Tomorrow we are planning a trip to the lake and hopefully see some fish, meanwhile we have tea to prepare and give the whisky a nudge

The Kalkite bay around the Eucumbene arm was taken over by busloads of school children, camping on a nearby property. They were canoeing, bush walking and having a healthy time, certainly the envy of our city bound schools. So, we needed to fish further down the dam. The walk was interesting, as we saw several good fish but only a tiddler landed. We decided to come back after dark and see if they would entertain a little nocturnal activity. We worked up and down the shoreline, fishing nice drop offs and rocky points, but could not turn a scale.

The next day we headed into Jindy, had a coffee and pie and chatted to the staff in Highlander Outfitters. We bought a few flies to add to our boxes of 1000's, but in our hearts

we knew that it was a waste of time. On our way out of town I got a message from Don and John, the Italian connection, who were camped on the lake. John lamented the lack of fish and I could relate to his woes, though having said that, they scored a nice one that night and drowned it with copious amounts of vino to celebrate.

The rest of the week continued with little action and us doubting our fishing ability. We ventured many theories, including water temperature, recent snow and melt, air temperatures, lack of insects, but what we didn't doubt was the number of fish in the river. I saw a couple of grandads, plus others, but they need a catalyse to get them going. We headed back home after a week, scratching our collective heads wondering what we could have done differently. I took a quick trip to BWC to get some essentials, and spoke to Brett, who confirmed my fears that the trout had been quite everywhere. I know that my last trip to Thomms was a blank, now the Snowy. Where do we go from here? What us fly fishermen always do, plan another trip of course..............

Glenbawn Carp

Glenn Olney and myself had a week fishing at Lake Glenbawn.

We started the day chasing bass by trolling. We did this for several days until the weather cleared.

We were waiting for clear skies, so we could polaroid for carp. We had checked out a bay on the eastside of the lake. Here we had the sun shining over our shoulders allowing us to see the carp swimming by. They were there, not in great numbers, but moving and feeding.

We pulled the boat up on the shore, set up our fly rods and set off in different directions.

The carp were being finicky, swimming past the fly, avoiding the fly. Another issue was placing a slow sinking fly in front of a moving carp. Lots of casting resulted in the occasional interest and hook up with the target.



We had two days with clear skies, the third day it was a little cloudy which made it more difficult to see the fish. More patience and success followed.



KC Crawler

It's time to share.

I have had some very successful trips over the last Month or so at Lake StClair and would like to share one of the flies I am using and how I fish it.

After some inspiration from other member's flies (Paul, Eddie & Russell) and some experience of my own I have come up with this fly "The KC Crawler" aptly named by Fiona. It has a perfect silhouette of a Mudeye with a small amount of UV in the chenille and those little rubber legs in the wiggle dubbing just say eat me.

I use a 6/7 Innovator Distance Rod with a SA Mastery Titan WF-7-F line and a 10' Tapered leader 14lb. This line performs very well in the conditions at StClair.

I fish this fly after dark when there is not much surface action going on and do a slow figure of eight nymphing retrieve at a pace that you can stay in touch with your fly. It depends on the wind.

The takes are varied from slamming it to mostly very subtle slurp in and swim off so you need to concentrate on anything that feels different. A strip strike is the best when you feel a subtle take. The takes can be as soon as the fly hits the water to right in close near your feet, so be ready.

If you are not getting bites change your retrieve slightly and if that doesn't work move slightly down the bank to a new spot. If that doesn't work then heaven forbid change your fly or go home.

Brett and Cherie at BWC Flies is the place to go to get your materials and they would be glad to help with any questions.





Materials

Hook Kamasan B830 #8 or Gamakatsu S10 #6

Eyes Self-made glass eyes or Spirit River Large Mono eyes

Thread Seperfli Classic Waxed Thread 6/0 in Dark Olive. (Black will do)

Body Hareline UV Mottled Galaxy Mop Chenille in Lt Olive

Overwing Black Duck Feathers or Substitute with Partridge or Soft Hen Hackle

Head Hareline Hare'e Wiggle Dub in Olive

Steps

1. Make eyes

Get some Green glass beads and 40lb Mono. Melt the end of the Mono to make a blob on the end.

Slide a bead onto the mono down to the blob on the end.

Grab the mono with forceps then slide the second bead on. The forceps will gauge the width of the eyes.

Melt the end of the mono to secure the second eye.



You can put some UV resin on each eye to make them more secure.

2. Place the hook in the vice and start the thread going down to the bend and back to approximately two hook eyes back from the eye of the hook.

3. Tie in the eyes at this point, ensure they are level. Add a drop of super glue to secure in place.



4. Take the thread halfway back to the bend and tie in the Mop Chenille. Tie the chenille in all the way back to the start of the bend, then take the thread forward to behind the eyes. The piece of tied in chenille will make the bum of the mudeye a bit bigger.



5. Wrap the chenille forward over the tied in chenille up to behind the eyes and tie in.



6. Prepare 3 or 4 Feathers by picking off the fluff at the base of the feather, then stack on top of each other and tie in as an overwing just behind the eyes. The tips of the feather need to be just past the bend of the hook. Trim the feather stems off in front of the eyes when tied in.





7. Make a 50cm to 75cm dubbing loop behind the eyes and the take the thread forward to just behind the eye. Do a half hitch and hang your bobbin out the front.





8. Prepare the Wiggle Dub and put in the dubbing loop. I use a dubbing clip to transfer the dubbing from the table to the dubbing loop.





9. Twist the dubbing loop up to make a rope. Pick any legs out that have been twisted in.



10. Wrap the dubbing rope around the eyes to make the head. Figure eight around the eyes. Try not to crowd the hook eye.



- 11. It's time to whip finish now.
- 12. Pick out any trapped legs with your bodkin and trim any that are too long.



13. Use a Velcro brush to release some of the dubbing fibres.
